- Sarah sings the national anthem at the school football game (Yes, she is taking part in the most important song for our country).
- The entire class stands and says the Pledge of Allegiance. (Yes, we all want to take part in the Pledge of Allegiance)
- Scott throws his soda can on the ground and leaves it there. (No, we do not leave our trash for others to pick up)
- > Stacy paints words and pictures on the side of her school building when she knows this is against the rules. (No, we never want to paint on something that is not ours and we do not have permission to paint. This is considered vandalism and is illegal)
- Lucy is driving around with her windows down and her radio very loud so people all around her are listening to her radio. (This is not being a good citizen. Being a good citizen is thinking about others. Lucy is making others listen to her music and they may not want to. This can also be a safety issue because the people around her can't hear the emergency vehicle sirens over her music.)
